• Globalization has dramatically altered the workplace. Today's employers seek job candidates with the technical knowledge and "soft skills" – problem solving, time management, cross-cultural competence – needed to succeed in current and future business environments. Responses from 13,000 hiring managers and CEOs in the 2020 QS Global employer survey revealed that more than 25% said "international experience" was a job recruitment *priority*.













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JAPAN & INTERNATIONAL BRANCH CAMPUSES

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JAPAN ABROAD

Overseas offices or "bases" of Japanese universities reached <u>690</u> by 2018. Two-thirds of these were located in Asia.

Several joint universities were established in Egypt, Malaysia, and Vietnam under bilateral government agreements

JAPAN Pre & Post-Pandemic

- **OUTBOUND.** In 2020, only <u>1,500 students</u> from Japanese universities studied abroad. Only <u>18,000</u> Japanese studied overseas versus 78,000 in 2019.
- **MISSING OUT.** Japanese students completing their studies overseas dropped from a peak of 82,945 in 2004 to 57,501 in 2011 according to <u>OECD</u> <u>data</u>. Dropping more each year.
- U.S. BOUND STUDENTS
 - JAPANESE 46,496 in 2000 | 17,554 in 2019
 - TOTAL 547,867 in 2000 | 1,075,496 in 2019

TURNING AWAY FROM STUDYING ABROAD

JAPAN Pre & Post-Pandemic

- INBOUND Foreign students
 - [1978] 5,849 international students
 [2019] 312,214 international students
 [2021] 242,444 international students in Japan (universities, language schools, trade institutions).
 * Top feeders: China (50%), Vietnam (20%), Nepal (8%)
 ** Less than 1,200 American students
- GOV'T PUSH GLOBAL 30 | SUPER GLOBAL
 - Catalyst for educational reform
 - Contribute to economic success;
 - Cement positive reputation overseas
- **TRENDS.** Significant drop. Closed borders kept 10% of these students overseas.
- CHALLENGES. Visas, logistics, language, calendar

 Build Adjust the International College




II.1. Build/Adjust the Program at Universities in Japan

- Make a half-year program (September to December) and/or a oneyear program (September to July).
- Credits would be decided by the origin university in the U.S.
- Classes would be offered in English and Japanese language classes.
- The U.S. students will pay the Japanese tuition.



Feature of HTIC



- Quarter system (September, January, April, and June/July)
- 60 credits for Associate in Arts Degree (transferable)
- Japanese language and anthropology, history classes



e.g. Syracuse students spent two terms at HTIC and went to Tokai University in Japan.



III. Experience of Double (Dual) Degree Program with Tokai University and HTIC

- Tokai University 124 credits (BA or BS degree)
- Hawaii Tokai International College 60 credits (AA degree)

Tokai University HTIC (Summer, Fall, and Winter 30 credits + 30 credits: AA degree) Tokai University 30 credits + 94 credits: BA or BS degree)
